These labor market projections should be used in conjunction with the users' knowledge of the state and local economy, and current events that may have an impact on the projections.***" This analysis merely identifies the occupations that are projected to have the greatest net and percent job openings in the next decade in the Central WIA. Results are based on openings due to growth, openings due to replacement, and total job openings.

## Background:

Every two years, the Center for Workforce Information and Analysis (CWIA) releases long-term occupational employment projections. Occupations are classified according to the Standard Occupational Code (SOC) system. Occupational employment projections reveal possible job opportunities by determining which occupations are expected to increase employment in the coming decade. Furthermore, educators and economic developers can implement training programs to meet the anticipated demand of certain jobs due to high replacement needs. Similarly, training programs can help transition employees in jobs that may experience a reduction in employment in the coming years. Finally, long-term occupational employment projections can assist in strategic planning by providing an insight into future employment trends.

Job openings result when new positions in an occupation are created by industrial expansion (growth) or when existing positions are vacated because of death, retirement, disability, or withdrawal for personal reasons (replacements). Vacancies created by promotion or transfers are not included in total job openings since there is no overall aggregate change in job availability. The total number of job openings is simply the sum of the growth needs and replacement needs in a particular occupation. In cases of negative growth exceeding replacement needs, total openings for that occupation are expressed as zero.

Information contained in this report can be especially helpful for ***schools*** (youth deciding on what jobs to pursue), ***CareerLinks*** (emphasizing occupations that may have high growth or replacement demands), ***economic developers*** (implementing strategic planning), and ***educators*** (training courses).

## **Methodology:**

CWIA provides employment estimates for occupations in 2004 and projects these values to 2014. Occupational Employment Statistics (OES), Current Employment Statistics (CES), and Quarterly Census of Employment & Wages (QCEW) programs provide the necessary information to formulate these projections. These programs are cooperative efforts between the Pennsylvania Department of Labor & Industry and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. No distinction is made between full-time and part-time jobs. Since these estimates reflect the number of jobs rather than persons, the secondary jobs of multiple jobholders are included.

## **Results:**

CWIA provides long-term occupational projections for the state, 22 Workforce Investment Areas, and 14 Metropolitan Statistical Areas. Projections are not broken down by county. This analysis looks at the occupational employment forecasts from 2004 to 2014 for the Central Workforce Investment Area, which is comprised of Centre, Clinton, Columbia, Lycoming, Mifflin, Montour, Northumberland, Snyder, and Union Counties.

Between 2004 and 2014, occupational employment in the Central WIA is expected to increase by about 13,000 jobs (or about 4.5%). These jobs represent those that can be attributed to new businesses being established or existing companies expanding (i.e., job openings due to growth). Furthermore, over an additional 67,000 openings may become available as current jobholders retire or leave their job for any other reason (i.e., job openings due to replacement). Overall, approximately 80,000 job openings may become apparent in the Central WIA in the coming decade.

Certain occupational groupings are expected to increase at a faster rate than the overall employment growth rate in the Central WIA. Such occupations demonstrate an increase in employment proportions between 2004 and 2014. The following occupational groupings (at the 2-digit SOC level) may provide significant job opportunities due to their expected rapid employment growth from 2004 to 2014 (***note: increases in employment proportions are based strictly on job openings due to growth***):

Nine (9) occupational groupings are expected to increase employment proportions in the Central WIA between 2004 and 2014, which indicates that the number of job openings in these occupations (*jobs due to growth*) may increase at a faster rate than the overall growth rate in the region. Combined, these occupations may expand employment by over 10,000 jobs (an increase of about 9.4% in employment for these occupations). Job seekers may find ample opportunity in these occupations in the coming decade due to their rapid growth.

Focusing on the major occupational groupings, the following tables identify the top 10 occupations at the 2-digit SOC code level that may experience the largest number of job openings due to growth, replacement, and total (the sum of job openings due to growth and replacement) in the Central WIA between 2004 and 2014 (*note: job openings are presented as average annual values*):

Between 2004 and 2014 in the Central WIA, *Education, Training, & Library Occupations* are expected to gain an average of 201 jobs per year due to growth, while *Community & Social Services Occupations* may experience an increase of about 73 jobs a year due to growth. Furthermore, *Office & Administrative Support Occupations* are expected to replace approximately 993 jobs a year on average in the region, and *Installation, Maintenance, & Repair Occupations* may replace about 253 jobs annually. With a large number of replacement jobs, *Office & Administrative Support Occupations* may experience about 1,166 job openings annually. Additionally, there may be approximately 1,063 annual job openings in the Central WIA for *Food Preparation & Serving Related Occupations*. Despite a reduction in overall employment values (i.e., a negative number of job openings due to growth), *Production Occupations* is expected to have about 475 job openings on an annual basis, which is due to a high number of replacement jobs.

While the previous charts identified occupational groupings that are expected to have the largest number of job openings, the following tables identify the top 15 specific occupations at the 6-digit SOC code level that may experience the largest number of job openings due to growth, replacement, and total (the sum of job openings due to growth and replacement) in the Central WIA between 2004 and 2014 (*note: job openings are presented as average annual values*):

Between 2004 and 2014 in the Central WIA, *Waiters & Waitresses* are expected to gain an average of 63 jobs per year due to growth, while *Truck Drivers, Heavy & Tractor-Trailer* may experience an increase of about 25 jobs a year due to growth. Furthermore, *Cashiers* are expected to replace approximately 387 jobs a year on average in the region, and *Executive Secretaries & Administrative Assistants* may replace about 68 jobs annually. With a large number of replacement jobs, *Cashiers* may experience about 343 job openings annually, despite the possibility that overall employment values may decrease during the time period (i.e., this occupation has a negative value for job openings due to growth). Additionally, there may be approximately 326 annual job openings in the Central WIA for *Retail Salespersons*.

### Conclusion:

From 2004 to 2014, occupational employment will increase by an average of about 1,260 jobs per year in the Central Workforce Investment Area (WIA) as a result of jobs due to growth. Additionally, replacement jobs may account for about 6,715 openings on an annual basis. Combined, there may be nearly 8,000 job openings a year in the Central WIA. Of course, unforeseen events may occur during this time period to reduce this projected increase, such as improvements in technology or efficiency that may reduce the need for manpower in certain occupations. Regardless, a variety of

occupations are projecting significant increases in job openings due to growth and/or replacement.

*Office & Administrative Support Occupations* and *Food Preparation & Serving Related Occupations* combined may account for over 22,000 job openings (about 28.0% of all job openings) by 2014 in the Central WIA. *Architecture & Engineering Occupations* and *Legal Occupations* are expected to have the smallest impact on job availability in the Central WIA. Together, these occupational groupings may only account for 860 job openings (about 1.1% of all job openings).

At the 6-digit Standard Occupation Code (SOC) level, approximately 52% of all occupations are projecting a positive increase in employment (i.e., positive job openings due to growth) between 2004 and 2014 in the Central WIA. Furthermore, about 7% of all occupations are forecasting an increase of at least 100 jobs in the same time period. Conversely, about 18% of all 6-Digit SOC occupations are expected to reduce employment values. Nonetheless, approximately 23% of all occupations may experience at least 100 job openings due to replacement in the Central WIA from 2004 to 2014.

Individuals may find the most opportunities in the occupations that are expected to increase employment in the next decade in the Central WIA. Of course, these projections do not guarantee the availability of job openings or the willingness of companies to hire certain individuals. Projections merely present possible future levels of employment in certain occupations. It is important for job seekers, educators, economic developers, and other decision-makers to consider the information presented in this report. However, the usefulness of these projections is limited, so other economic resources should be considered in making decisions relating to career pathways, training programs, and strategic planning.
